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2 Suspected In Slayings

The slayings of an Air Force sergeant and his wife, who were gunned down in the back yard of a Rancho Cordova home Feb. 2, may have been committed by two young men, a spokesman for the sheriff's department said today.

Along with the announcement, composite sketches of the two suspects, made from neighbors' descriptions, were released.

Sgt. Brian Maggione, 21, and his wife, Katie, 20, were accosted while walking their dog and shot to death at the rear of a home on La Gloria Drive in Rancho Cordova.

William Miller, assistant to the sheriff, said two young men were seen on La Gloria minutes

before the shooting. One was wearing a brown leather-type jacket, gathered at the waist with a zippered front, small collar and dark stain on the back. He was also wearing brown pointed boots. The other man was wearing a dark jacket, zippered in front with slash pockets, dark pants and black shoes or boots. He was also wearing brown leather gloves, Miller said.
